Measure A Essential Health Care Services Tax

n March 4, 2004, 71% of Alameda County voters passed Measure A, which imposed a half-cent sales tax to support emergency medical, hospital inpatient, outpatient, public health, mental health, and substance abuse services to indigent, low-income, and uninsured adults, children, families, seniors and other county residents.

Services Provided by Measure A

- Behavioral health, acute, ambulatory, emergency, urgent and trauma services at Highland Hospital and other public hospitals and wellness centers
- Assistance to low-income, homeless people, including those with special needs, to secure stable, supportive housing by Abode Services
- Crisis counseling, family therapy, case management, parent training, and school-based counseling provided by Horizons Family Counseling
- Mental health and case management services to families living in Dublin, Livermore and Pleasanton
- Opportunities for students and parents to learn how to deal with stress, identify signs of at-risk behavior, and learn about resiliency in adolescents
- Assistance to seniors to foster independence, promote safety and well-being, preserve dignity, and improve quality of life by LIFE ElderCare

Impact on Alameda County

- 39,775 uninsured residents received medical services at Alameda Health System through 297,889 outpatient visits, 82,060 visits to the Highland campus emergency room and trauma department, and 11,420 visits to John George Psychiatric Emergency Services.
- 1,563 Tri-Valley students received behavioral health prevention, early intervention and treatment services in a year.
- More than 800 meals per month served to lowincome Tri-Valley residents by Open Heart Kitchen.
- 400 adults, teens, and children living in the Tri-Valley area and Castro Valley received hospice services by Hope Hospice, Inc.
- 138 seniors screened, assessed and educated about fall risk by LIFE ElderCare.
- More than 50 seniors living in the Tri-Valley area received mental health counseling in a year by Senior Support Program of the Tri-Valley.
